Doorstep alert

Police officers in North West Leicestershire are warning residents to be on their guard after a pensioner in their area was charged £60 for a small number of cleaning products.

These doorstep scammers often target the elderly and vulnerable and will often portray an untrue account of their difficult lives to persuade the resident to part with more money. It's a scam.

Please keep an eye on elderly or vulnerable neighbours and family members.

Never feel pressured to buy anything. We always advise not to open the door to strangers and don't agree to buy goods or services on the doorstep.

The police are advising members of the public to call them if you spot these doorstep scammers on 101 or 999 in case of an emergency.

There have been numerous vaccine scams recently, this is the latest email vaccine scam where the link will connect you to a fake NHS webpage.

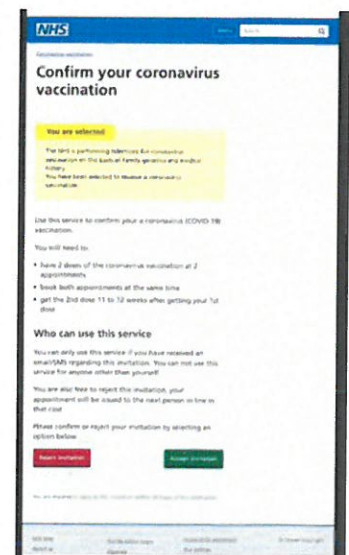
Remember, the NHS will contact you when it is your time for a vaccine.

The vaccine is free of charge on the NHS and the NHS will never ask for:

- Your bank account or card details
- Your pin or banking password
- Copies of personal documents to provide your identity such as your passport, driving licence, bills or pay slips

Courier Fraud

Leicestershire Police have received reports of a courier scam happening around the North West Leicestershire area.

Courier fraud occurs when a fraudster contacts victims by telephone, purporting to be a police officer or bank official. The caller might be able to confirm some easily obtainable basic details such as your full name and address to help substantiate the call.

During these uncertain times, please speak to your elderly relatives, neighbours, friends and warn them that this is happening.

The police are advising members of the public to call them if you spot these fraudsters on 101 or 999 in case of an emergency.

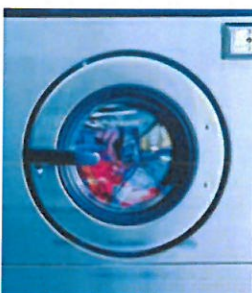
Safety recall

TK Maxx has issued a voluntary recall of selected baby sleeping bags sold between August 2018 and December 2020. The issue affects only the sleep bags for age 0-6 months.

The retailer is recalling the products due to the size of the neck hole, which could cause a baby to slip down the garment causing their face to be covered, which presents a risk of suffocation.

To check if your sleeping bag has been recalled, look at the size and style number on the sewn label.

Registering is a wise safety precaution. This means that you will never miss out on appliance safety recalls, keeping your family and property safe.

Button Cell Batteries

A BBC article reports on the dangers of button cell batteries after an 11-month-old girl had one lodged in her throat for four months.

Button cell batteries are used in everyday electrical items from watches to remote controls, key fobs, toys and novelty gifts. In the most extreme cases ingesting these batteries can cause death.

Here are some key messages:

- Store spare batteries securely
- Know which devices use button batteries and ensure they're properly secured
- Keep unsecured batteries or devices away from children
- Ensure children are aware of the dangers
- Safely dispose of dead button batteries immediately
- If you suspect your child has swallowed a battery, take them straight to A&E

These products have insufficient labelling and they contain an unknown amount of nicotine. These could be extremely harmful.

Cow & Gate and Aptamil Muesli products

Nutricia is recalling Cow & Gate and Aptamil Muesli products because some packs have been found to contain pieces of apple stalks. The presence of the apple stalks presents a choking hazard to babies making these products unsafe to eat.

If you have bought any of the recalled products do not feed them to your baby. Instead, return them to the store from where they were bought, with or without a receipt, for a full refund.
