Cracking Down on Crime at Fosse Park

As part of my recent Community Day in Blaby, I visited Fosse Park to see how Leicestershire Police are tackling business crime.

I met Sergeant Pemberton from the dedicated Fosse Park policing team. Their focus? Stopping shoplifting and anti-social behaviour in the area.

Since the team launched in summer, they've made multiple arrests of prolific shoplifters. They've also achieved a positive outcome rate of around

80% – leading to several custodial sentences. That's real progress.

I also spoke with Centre Manager Nick to review the impact. It was great to hear how this partnership is working. Businesses feel supported, and shoppers are safer.

Strong policing and strong teamwork are making Fosse Park a safer, even more enjoyable place to visit. Well done to the Fosse Park policing team!

Standing Up for Rural Communities



I recently met Marie Charles, the new NFU County Advisor, along with officers from our Rural Policing Team.

It was a great chance to strengthen our partnership and focus on what matters most to rural communities.

We talked about tackling rural theft and wildlife crime – both key priorities in my Police and Crime Plan. The team shared progress from targeted operations and extra patrols that are making a real difference across Leicestershire and Rutland.

I also highlighted the lobbying I've done to secure more

national support and resources from central Government for rural crime.

Working together means rural voices are heard. It means communities stay safe and prosperous. My commitment to our rural communities is steadfast, and I will continue to ensure rural communities are not left behind.

£10k Grants to Tackle Violence and Protect the Vulnerable

I've opened a new round of funding to help stop serious violence and keep people safe.

Community groups, charities, and parish councils can now apply for grants of up to £10,000 through my Community Action Fund. This round focuses on Violence and Vulnerability – a key priority in my Police and Crime Plan.

I want projects to apply that prevent knife crime, reduce harm, and give young people positive choices. That could mean school programmes teaching resilience, street outreach, healthy relationship workshops, youth mentoring, sports, arts, and skills training.

Serious violence affects everyone. By working together, we can guide young people away from crime and build safer, stronger communities.

As part of one of my recent Community Days, I visited Loughborough town centre to meet the team keeping the area safe.

I spoke with Loughborough BID about their work supporting local businesses and boosting the town's appeal. We also discussed anti-social behaviour, which remains a key concern for many residents.

I met two of the town's security guards who patrol the area daily. They play a vital role in reassuring shoppers, helping businesses, and working closely with police and council teams.

Their presence makes a real difference. It helps prevent problems before they start and ensures the town centre remains a welcoming, vibrant place for everyone.

Strong partnerships like these are essential to building safer communities.

Showcasing Prevention at the Midlands VAWG Conference

I was incredibly proud of my team who presented at the Midlands Violence Against Women and Girls (VAWG) Conference. Especially as we were the only PCC area showcasing a young people's prevention project.

Our session focused on two programmes we co-designed with young people, SHUSH and SHARA. These initiatives teach how to recognise harmful behaviours, understand consent, and build healthy relationships.

We shared how this community-led approach is making a real difference. It's sustainable, rooted in early prevention, and designed to create safer communities.

Together, we're laying the foundations for a future in which respect and safety come first.
